# FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: Joseph Cubells, MD, PhD

Joe Cubells is an associate professor in the departments of psychiatry and behavioral sciences and human genetics, as well as director of medical services at the Emory Autism Center. He is Co-principal Investigator (with Erica Duncan) on the R01-funded project, "Psychosis – related Physiological and Neuronal Phenotypes in 22q11 Deletion Syndrome." Outside of Emory, Joe is a member of the executive board of the Atlanta Autism Consortium, member of the board of directors for Georgia Options, as well as reviewer for the Special Emphasis Panel for Review of P50 Autism Centers of Excellence, Center for Scientific Review and National Institutes of Health.

What Joe most enjoys about his work is interacting with his wonderful colleagues, especially Danielle Belva and others at the Emory Autism Center such as Erica Duncan, Opal Ousley and David Parker, co-principal investigator, co-investigator and post-doctoral fellow, respectively, on their NIH-funded R01 project. He enjoys working with the patients and families in the clinic. Many of the patients he works with depend on family members for support and care, often for their entire lives - their families step to the task without complaint, and with love in their hearts. He describes them as truly inspiring examples of humanity's best.

In terms of teaching, Joe offers a clinical elective on psychopharmacological treatment of adults with autism and other neurodevelopmental disabilities, half a day per week for at least one semester, and preferably for a year. The elective is one that is fairly unique among psychiatry residencies. Mentoring residents in this elective has been a great pleasure.

Some of the key highlights of his career trajectory include attending college at Johns Hopkins University, receiving his MD-PHD from Albert Einstein College of Medicine, residency from Columbia-Presbyterian and New York State Psychiatric Institute, serving as a Reader's Digest Research Fellowship from Cornell University Medical College, and being a faculty member first at Yale University Psychiatry for nine years and now at Emory since 2004.

Joe has always avoided being too involved in "political" aspects of psychiatry, but as he has worked with hundreds of adult patients with autism and their families, the urgent need to incorporate education about autism into psychiatric training, and to train adult psychiatrists knowledgeable about autism, has become clear. Looking to the future, he hopes to advocate for that cause. As genetic testing becomes ever-more relevant to the practice of clinical psychiatry, he hopes to expand his role in educating colleagues about using genetic testing in practice.

Outside of work, his interests include keeping up with his three grown children, Rebecca (35), Aaron (33) and Sarah (27), as well as All things outdoors (hiking, fishing, hunting, etc) and his dogs Frodo and Junebug.

# ADJUNCT FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: Hasani Baharanyi, MD

Hasani Baharanyi trained in general psychiatry at the Massachusetts General Hospital and child and adolescent psychiatry at Emory. After graduating from the Emory Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Fellowship Program, he began working in private practice and community mental health clinics. He loves learning and developing as clinician and currently enrolled in the Emory University Psychoanalytic Institute as a psychoanalytic candidate. Hasani also learns best when teaching and writing. To that end, he wrote a chapter on ADHD for the book Pediatric Mental Health for Primary Care Providers: A Clinician's Guide and published an article in The American Psychoanalyst. He has also supervised and taught child psychiatry fellows at Emory and Morehouse School of Medicine.

As an adjunct faculty member in the Emory Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, Hasani has given lectures on typical child and adolescent development to the Emory psychiatry residents and supervised an Emory child psychiatry fellow.

Of the many benefits of being an adjunct faculty member, Hasani most enjoys teaching and supervising trainees. In addition, he appreciates connecting with his fellow adjunct faculty members and community. He is motivated by their dedicated work. They publish, teach, lead and mentor while providing exceptional care to their patients. They are truly a dynamic and inspiring group of people.

Hasani thinks people would be surprised to discover he was a Reggaetón dancer in his past life and continues to exercise by running regularly and doing high intensity interval training.

Kevin McKnight works as the program coordinator at the Emory Brain Health Center for the Healthy Brain and Child Development Study. # TRAINEE SPOTLIGHT: Kathryn Bertacchi, MD

Kathryn Bertacchi transitioned from the general psychiatry training program at Emory in summer of 2021 to Emory's child and adolescent training program, where she will graduate in two months' time. She has worked to increase the visibility and services for the transgender and gender diverse population throughout her career as a trainee through service development and intra-departmental teaching. She spends clinic time with Emory, CHRIS180, Georgia State University, the Marcus Autism Center and Children's Healthcare of Atlanta.

Emory has empowered Kathryn's personal and professional growth with wonderful mentors, passionate and curious peers that challenge each other and a program that uplifts its' fellows and their patients. She highlights how Dr. Holton has built an incredible sense of community in the fellowship which is thoughtful about how intersectionality impacts how we move throughout the world. The result is a fellowship program that feels like home - a place that is supportive, inclusive and full of life and friends. Kathryn loves the work of making meaningful relationships with her patients and primarily enjoys working with families as a unit. She feels most fulfilled being able to see a family come together in joy again after a period of difficulty.

In her last year of residency, Kathryn served as chief resident at Grady where she was a recipient of the resident of the year award, developed the diversity chief position for Emory's general psychiatry program and produced a series of lectures and workshops promoting diversity, equity and inclusion. She has continued these efforts in fellowship, having established two longitudinal psychotherapy groups for transgender and gender non-conforming adolescents.

Outside of Emory, Kathryn enjoys sewing, cooking, video games and hanging out with her partner and two annoying adopted cats. She is also spending time interior designing for their upcoming move, where she is thrilled at the prospect of being able to sit down for dinner instead of having the dining room table overtaken by her home office.

Kathryn's plans for the future include building on the diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, including founding the psychiatric support arm of the clinic for transgender children and adolescents. She is looking forward to expanding her teaching and research about the transgender population. She plans to work against recently passed harmful and discriminatory legislation against this group while supporting those affected. Personally, she plans to spend her time between the end of fellowship and starting her new position this summer by fully embracing her sleepy nature and stay-cationing in bed with her aforementioned cats.
